Zonta D23 Service Project – Breast Care Cushions

As D23 project coordinator, I ask clubs to provide me with breast cushion production and distribution information on a six-monthly basis. I am happy to say that 26 of the 26 clubs participating in the project submitted a report for the six months ended 31 December 2024.

Approximately 3000 were distributed for the period.

That makes it close to 6000 for the calendar year ended 31 December 2024.

I really appreciate the fabulous support this project receives, and I know the recipients of the cushions are very grateful. As a club we receive lots of great feedback and generous donations to support the ongoing production of cushions.

It also a great fellowship activity. Jenny Ray's record-breaking sewing day with her golf friends is a testament to that. Wendy Cameron, also a member of the golf group, mentioned to me that this activity gave the ladies a sense of community and great satisfaction.

I have set out below the totals by Area with a comparison to the prior year.

Zonta Says Now

Zonta Says Now Australia benefits from having a strong contingent of Zonta Australia executive members. This means that Zonta Says Now and Zonta Australia can make sure that goals of the two subsets of Zonta International remain closely aligned.







At the February Think Tank, we discussed the upcoming 2025 Federal Election and the issues that Zonta Says Now members would consider important to advocate in the election period.

Zonta values advocacy. It is partisan. Not aligned with any political party but strives to influence political decisions to be areas concerning women. This means that the issues do not only have to be just issues that directly affect' – they can also be areas of society, economics and politics that cause concern for women.

From this criterion the major areas of concern for Zonta Says Now during the 25 Federal election campaign:

Gender-Based Violence

A core component of Zonta advocacy already, it is still a societal problem that increases when there are extra stresses caused by climate change, such as natural disasters and rising temperatures. December speaker Dr Catherine Trundle particularly outlined the effects of increased heat.

The wellbeing of future generations

That we need a legislative framework that ensures that intergenerational equity and wellbeing are considered in government and other public decision-making. That there is a duty on government and public bodies to consider the long-term impact of their decisions in terms of climate change and future well-being on our present and future young people. That there is an independent statutory commissioner for future generations to make sure everything this act is trying to achieve is achieved.

ZCMOY Sponsored \$500 Science Award

In December 2024 before the Christmas holidays began, I had the honour of attending the Worawa Aboriginal College end of year celebration and graduation ceremony, to present the 2024 ZCMOY sponsored \$500 Science Award to the winner Akia-Marie Lake (Year 9 student). The Science Award was one of 12 awards presented by sponsors, to students who had either excelled or shown potential in the nominated field.

Our winner Akia-Marie (age 15) is from the Kalano community in Katherine, NT, and is fortunate to have her younger sister Akeima (age 13) attend the College as well. Both girls were extremely excited to have their proud parents and younger brother travel down from Katherine, to attend the event and the graduation of four senior students.

Thanks to ZCMOY club member Sue Lees and her vast community and education-related connections, we announced at our September ZEDx First Nations Women's Hear their Voices forum, that our club would support this award.

Worawa Aboriginal College is Victoria's first and only Aboriginal school, which originally opened as a co-ed school in Frankston in 1983. Over the years the school decided to transition and specifically cater exclusively for girls. This was in recognition of the limited availability of educational programs tailored to meet the needs of Aboriginal girls within the education sector at large.

Since 2010, the College provides a holistic education and boarding experience for young Aboriginal women (Years 7-12), who come from Aboriginal communities in urban, regional and remote Australia. Over the years the College has been transformed and the curriculum strengthened under the guidance and love of former leader Aunty Lois Peeler (now Elder in Residence). From 2023, the passion and expertise of Executive Director/ Principal Tanya Peeler leads the College to grow, support and empower up to 35 young Aboriginal women, to flourish in a bi-cultural, learning environment.

It was a privilege and up-lifting experience, to see how education in a supportive, culture-led, learning environment, has helped shape the future of these young Aboriginal women. You go girls – chase your dreams and help others in your community to flourish.

Founded by Australian humanitarian Gemma Sisia in 2002, The School of St Jude is one of the largest charity schools in Africa, providing free scholarships to 100% of its 1,800 primary and secondary school students every year.

Gemma's vision and effort have enabled improved opportunities and lives for many young people and families, particularly helping to build a better world for women and girls in Africa.




